Striving to Promote Nuclear Power for Society's Sustainable Development

JAIF Chairman IMAI Takashi

Dealing with global warming has become a top-priority issue internationally, and nations have been coming to recognize and embrace the target of carbon neutrality by 2050. Japan, too, has pledged to the world that it would achieve carbon neutrality by that year, and clearly states in the 6th Strategic Energy Plan that "nuclear power is positioned as an important base-load power source contributing to the stability of the long-term energy supply-and-demand structure," and that "the necessary amount of nuclear power will be continuously utilized."

At the same time, amid the increasingly severe international situation and recent hikes in commodity prices, many nations are increasingly concerned about energy security. That makes nuclear energy—on the premise of ensured safety—an essential power source, given that besides being an economical, stable source of supply, it is highly environmentally suitable and excellent from the viewpoint of the so-called "S+3E": safety, plus the conventional three E's of energy security, economy and environmental protection.

Additionally, many domestic technologies are utilized in nuclear facilities and equipment. In order to fulfill its role, Japan's nuclear industry will endeavor actively to ensure safety, restart existing nuclear power plants as quick-

ly as possible, extend their operating lifetimes, and tackle the issue of constructing new plants and replacing older ones.

To support development projects underway domestically and overseas as well as to sustainably utilize nuclear power in Japan, it is also the industry's important role to secure and educate good human resources, and to maintain and secure technological and industrial infrastructure.

In Fukushima, thanks to the ongoing efforts of relevant parties, moves are being made toward lifting the evacuation order in areas designated as those where residents will not be able to return home for a long time. The nuclear industry, aware that there can be no future for nuclear power in Japan without the restoration and revitalization of Fukushima, will support those efforts even more.

Making use of domestic and international networks, we at the Japan Atomic Industrial Forum (JAIF) work to share information on nuclear power in a manner that is easy to understand, and to carry out activities to promote understanding, human-resource development and international cooperation, all so that the industry may continue to contribute to people's lives and industrial activities.




JAPAN ATOMIC INDUSTRIAL FORUM, INC.

Supporting Human Resources Development

JAIF serves as the joint secretariat of the Japan Nuclear Human Resources Development Network (JN-HRD.Net), an academia-government-industry partnership framework for nuclear HRD. Under the framework, Japan-IAEA Nuclear Energy Management Schools (NEMS) have been held since 2012. Securing qualified personnel for the nuclear industry is important for its sustainable development. To this end, JAIF holds annual job matching seminars at two cities for nuclear industry and university students.
